THE BORDON AND LIPHOOK CHARITY

The Bordon and Liphook Charity raises money through its two charity shops – Bordon Care and Liphook Care – and distributes the profits to people in need who live in Bordon, Liphook and the surrounding areas. The distribution is done by way of grants to local individuals who have been referred to the Charity by professionals, and grants to local organisations and charities.

The Bordon and Liphook Charity

As well as making their profits available for the local community, the two shops also provide affordable clothes and household items. The Charity thus fulfils not one, but two essential roles for the local community. In spite of the obvious need for such a charity in every town in the country, this Charity is, so far as we are aware, the only one of its kind.

An outstanding year in some respects and a challenging one in other aspects.

Report from Carl Tantum Chairman of Trustees of The Bordon and Liphook Charity

The main thrust of our Charity work continues unabated and because of financial pressures in the economic downturn we continue to be very busy helping those whose need is greatest.

That altruism, i.e. 'regard for others as a principle of action' is respected locally as the partnership between ourselves and the Community continues and thrives. It is worthwhile repeating that your support, of quality donations to the two Charity shops, Liphook Care and Bordon Care, is and has been vital. All that we do would cease tomorrow if you ceased thinking about us. So this is the right time and place to say a big 'thank you' to you all.

Since inception we have turned your donations into cash. There is no doubt that our prices in the two shops are at a much more reasonable level than our competition and this helps shoppers to achieve real value.

The figures are outstanding. The two shops have achieved since inception total sales of £1,340,000 ! As we pay our way commercially, and are not grant aided in any way, the monies left over come to you the Community by way of grants to organisations but mostly individuals. Some £667,000 from the Shops to the Charity. Our expense ratio in the Charity is minimal so the total grants from the Charity to you has been £612,245. Last year our Grants have been £61,379. Quite incredible! The Boltini Family Trust gave us £5,000 to assist deprivation in our area, and Cllr Ferris Cowper gave up £4,000 to aid similarly in the whole of the EHDC district. This money we administer.

There is a lovely picture of a £400 Grant for specialist musical instruments for Hollywater school. They put on a musical recital for us which was so good.

We have just learnt that the Award by the Community Foundation for 'Outstanding Charitable Contribution to the County of Hampshire' has been given to us. A lovely tribute to our Volunteers and all those who help us so much – and that's you!!

In addition our Shop Managers, Christine Kinge and Kay Green continue to run the two shops impeccably. Our shop volunteers are amazing, their commitment is total and sustained over so many years. We cherish them greatly. We mourn the loss of those we have lost this last year, including Jean Supple's husband John, Margaret Batson and Elsie Leatherby. Changes in the Trustees this year with the loss of Val Webb and Renata Reina. We are very grateful to both of them for their sterling work for the Charity. They will be greatly missed, Renata still continues to give us her time as a Volunteer in Liphook Care Shop. Mandy Batten replaced Pauline Parkinson as our Case Worker in 2008 and Mandy has kindly agreed to serve as a Trustee for a few months for which we are very grateful.

You may find enclosed details of the new 'Bordon and Liphook Endowment Fund'. This has been kick-started by us with a commitment of £5k. pa., over the next three years. This is matched in turn by the 'Grassroots Fund' and will grow to £33k in three years time. Every £ you put into the fund will be matched £ for £ over the next two years. A worthwhile investment for you to engage in direct help for your local Community. This is the first step towards the establishment of a permanent Endowment Fund for this area. Interest can be drawn down each year and the establishment costs are met through the Community Foundation. If, for example, our Charity shops cease to provide our Funds at sometime in the future, this Endowment will provide the answer. It is particularly suitable for legacies and one off donations. It does need to be built up obviously and this is where once again, we need your generous assistance. So the enclosed leaflet is important.

It is right and proper that we should think of the future, and the permanent Endowment Fund is one positive development. In addition we have had a major business review carried out by a Company called Profiles and their CEO David Gaines. This well written report has been instructive and its findings and recommendations are still being assimilated by the Trustees. It gives us a model for the future and looks at our strengths and weaknesses. The recommendations for the way ahead sets out cost-effective measures we can take. It lays the foundation for an expansion of the successful Charity that we run now. It looks at the succession issue which is so important.

Our very able Charity Administrator Christine Dickie left us in September as she moved to another district. She had been with us for some five years and she carried out her role with compassion, and diligence. Her sad loss has been mitigated by her replacement Nikki Bonner who has in a short time proved to be a worthy successor.

We continue to run our Charities Interaction Group Meetings every six months. This brings together the Voluntary Charity Sector with the Statutory Agencies. This year will be the 14th. year. We have tried to stop this meeting from time to time but to no avail as they are too valuable to the participants!

Finally to our Trustees – well done, another year of decisions some of which are not easy, but are life-changing so far as the applicants are concerned.

Carl Tantum - Chairman of the Trustees

I joined the Bordon & Liphook Charity in August, but it already feels like I have been here for years! My predecessor Christine Dickie already had an excellent system in place for dealing with applications and the administration and she gave me a very thorough induction. The Trustees have been so supportive to me and helped me to settle into my role and I have enjoyed getting to know more about the organisations we work so closely with such as the Furniture Helpline, Elizabeth Dibben Centre, the CAB, EHDC and more.

Report from Nikki Bonner
Administrator of The Bordon and
Liphook Charity

I have worked for a number of charities over the years, both local and national, all of which I have really felt quite passionate about. But I must say that the Bordon & Liphook Charity is the charity that I empathise with the most. As a local resident myself, I now feel that I am really helping the community that I live in. Life can be tough at the best of times, and in this economic climate, people are really starting to struggle financially. General living expenses have increased and I have noticed that more and more applications are coming to the Charity for financial assistance with heating bills, for furniture and for food. Last year we gave out nearly £6,000 in food vouchers to individuals and to organisations to distribute to local people.

We also gave out nearly £10,000 to local organisations/ charities. The Charity gave Hollywater School £400 towards some musical instruments and we were invited along to an assembly to watch the children perform using their new instruments, which included Ukeleles, Alto Diatonic Metallophones and Alto Diatonic

Xylophones. It was quite moving to see the children get so much enjoyment from them and to see how the instruments assist with their development. Such a proud and rewarding moment.

The way in which we operate enables us to act quickly and help people at crisis point. Christmas is perhaps an even tougher time for people, and this year we had the impact of heavy snow which just added to the stress. We gave out over £1,800 in food vouchers to local families in December. I must say how rewarding it was for me to be in a position where I could help several families in emergency situations and to help make their Christmas that little bit more enjoyable.

The Charity has experienced a remarkably good year in difficult times. Despite some shop turnover fluctuations, grants again have been substantial. The £9,550 under 'other' in the accounts, reflects the Cllr Ferris Cowper initiative and the Boltini Family Trust monies. Over the next year we must endeavour to build on our reserves whilst at the same time continue to provide assistance to those in our local community who need help.

The annual lunch was held at the Woodlark in June and some volunteers were awarded with certificates and badges to recognise their hours of service to the community.

The decline of shoppers in the Forest Centre has been a reflection of the general economic situation in the country but nevertheless, Bordon Care Shop has managed to keep up its income and so do its part in enabling the Bordon and Liphook Charity to continue its assistance to the community.

I must thank each one of the team of volunteers for their willing, loyal hard work every week. Without all this work, the shop would not be the friendly, cheerful, helpful place that it undoubtedly is!

We have recruited two new volunteers this year, Jilly Gooding and Katy Boddington.

Volunteers and partners met at the Woodlark in early January for a most enjoyable Christmas lunch. So 2009 ended as another successful year for Bordon Care Shop.

Kay Green - Manager Bordon Care Shop

The year started after a much needed refurbishment of the shop.

It was a difficult first half of the year when the sales were only 1% up, however the upturn from August produced a year/year increase 11%.

Expenses are in line with expectations although negotiations for an increase in the shop rent from September 09 have still to be concluded.

The donation to the Bordon and Liphook Charity was £41,000 an increase of £6,000, partly due to a change in policy distributing funds sooner to the charity.

2010 is going to be an interesting retail year.

2009 has been a good year for Liphook Care. In May, we celebrated our tenth anniversary of the shop opening and all the volunteers and some of the previous managers we treated to lunch in the Nepalese restaurant. The lunch was enjoyed by all and it was a chance for some of the longstanding volunteers to catch up with the managers that had moved on. Each volunteer was presented with a certificate to thank them for their contribution towards helping their local community.

Report from Christine Kinge
Manager of Liphook Care Shop

Over the summer months, the shop was painted, had the ceiling repaired, new flooring and things moved around. The shop is looking bigger and more organised than before, but still has kept its "old fashion charity shop" feel that the customers like. They know that they can still get a bargain and can rummage to their hearts content but know that the shop has moved forward without losing its charm. The changes have gone down well with the customers and volunteers and I would like to thank those that helped make this happen. The changes we have made have had a positive and profitable affect on the shop with the weekly takings showing an increase and more customers using the shop.

In December the volunteers and management had their Christmas get together, this year we went to the Woodlark at Whitehill and an enjoyable evening was had by all. I would like to finish by saying a big thank you to all the volunteers for their support and continuous help over the year, which without this we would not be able to continue helping the local community. Congratulations and well done to everyone.

The year 2009 has shown various fluctuations. The weather for the first two months of the year adversely affected the turnover. However, since May when the shop was given a facelift, the extra income generated month on month, has more than covered the cost and has in the main been much appreciated by customers and volunteers alike; all this despite the credit crunch.

Report from Jennie Vernon-Smith
Treasurer of Liphook Care Shop

Due to an increase in maintenance costs, the amount that the shop has given to the Charity is down on last year, but I am hopeful that now these items have been adjusted and there is more awareness of this branch of the Charity, that next year there will be an increase in donations.

In fact, the first week of December saw record takings, and then came the snow again....., but it has been a privilege and pleasure to work with such an enthusiastic collection of volunteers.

Jennie Vernon-Smith - Treasurer

There have been two Shop Managers. Initially Jean Parrott and latterly Kay Green who has been in post for over 16 years. There are approximately 27 Volunteers who do a superb job. The shop trades under the name "Bordon Care Shop Limited". This is a Company Limited by Guarantee with the two shares held by Jennie Vernon-Smith and Carl Tantum, who is also the Company Secretary. Ged Shepherd took on the role of Treasurer from David Hay in 2003, but Ged moved away in 2008 and Adrian Thomas kindly took over. Jennie Vernon-Smith took over David Hay's directorship in 2007. In 1999 the shop received a major internal 'makeover' costing some £6,000. A similar figure has been spent in December 2005 for new lighting, ceiling, etc. In December 2008, a new reflective wood floor was laid, with new counter and lay-out, generally enhancing the shop's appeal. The new shop layout has proved very attractive for customers.

Organisation
Bordon Care Shop Ltd

In May 1999 a loan from the Bordon Charity (now known as the Bordon & Liphook Charity) was made to "Liphook Care", a new and second Charity Shop operating from 23 Station Road Liphook. It was set up with the same objectives but with special emphasis also on assisting Macmillan. During the first year the shop was ably run by Andrea Evans. It achieved its target of £25,000, and repaid the loan within the year.

Organisation
Liphook Care Shop Ltd

The shop is run by a Company Limited by Guarantee and has two Directors – Jennie Vernon-Smith who is the Treasurer and Carl Tantum who is the Company Secretary. There are some 17 Volunteers who are the backbone of the daily operation. Again the Community of Liphook has been most supportive in providing donations and creating the excellent yearly turnover. Madelaine Briant took over running of the shop from Andrea Evans, and her successor, Jill Morgan, was appointed in early 2001. Jill Morgan resigned in April 2005 and a new manager, Angela Keeling, was appointed. Vivienne Gabriel took over as manager in the summer of 2006. She retired in early 2008 and Christine Kinge was appointed. The 'mini makeover' of the shop has been very successful and the turnover has increased.

The 'Bordon & Liphook Charity' grew out of a 'good idea' to create a Charity shop at a time when the Bordon Chamber of Industry & Commerce was operational. This was in 1992, Premises were found at the Elizabeth Dibben Centre in Pinehill Road, first at the front in the waiting area and then in the large room at the rear. Donations from the general public were immediately encouraging and although the trading position was poor, this period of three years gave the impetus to go onto the next stage.

After some careful negotiation, there was sufficient confidence to move the shop into splendid new premises at 15 The Forest Centre. This would not have been possible without the active encouragement of the Social Services who gave a grant of £8,000 towards the shop fitting out. The shop is run under the name of 'Bordon Care Shop Limited,' and the Charity was set up separately under the name of 'The Bordon Charity.' In 2006 the Charity was renamed 'The Bordon & Liphook Charity' to more accurately reflect its area of work plus the contribution from the two Charity shops.

The original Trustees in 1992 were Rev. Michael Cronin, David Hay, Yvonne Kilburn, and Carl Tantum. Yvonne Kilburn resigned in 1999 and was replaced by Steve Melhuish. Kay Green was appointed a Trustee in 1997, finishing her term in 2001. Rev. Cronin was posted to Southampton and resigned in February 2002, at the same time as Penny Carter was appointed.

The addition of the Liphook shop created further Trustee opportunities and Andrea Evans, Bernard Manning,

and Robin Oliver became Trustees in 1999. Andrea Evans resigned in early 2000 and was replaced by Madelaine Briant who resigned during the year. Robin Oliver resigned in 2001 for personal reasons. Betty Holt was appointed in 2002. In 2003 Jane Jones became a Trustee and took over the role of Treasurer from David Hay. Sadly, Bernard Manning died in 2003. Graham and Val Webb were appointed Trustees in January 2004. In 2007 Graham Webb, Penny Carter and Betty Holt retired and were replaced by Gerard Alexander, Jennie Vernon-Smith and Renata Reina. Pauline Parkinson also retired and Mandy Batten has taken the place of her as Case Worker in 2008. Towards the end of 2009, there were two Trustee resignations from Val Webb and Renata Reina. Mandy Batten kindly agreed to serve as a Trustee for a few months.

The Trustees' brief is to decide on requests for assistance from individuals and organisations. These come mainly from statutory agencies such as the CAB, social services, the Community Mental Health Team, housing associations and health visitors.

The Trustees meet regularly and respond immediately in emergency cases. They work only on case numbers and never know the identity or address of applicants. The charity is approved by the Charity Commissioners under charity number 1032428.

A management consultancy review at the end of December 2009 has suggested major changes for the Charity.
